#### **November 4th**

Every year residents of Le Quesnoy commemorate the liberation on November 4 and on Anzac Day. This year the town held a special ceremony followed by a lunch, and in the afternoon, Raymonde Dramez, the former Mayor of neighbouring Beaudignies, gave free guided tours of the NZ Liberation Museum – Te Arawhata and its surrounds.

#### **November 11th**

An armistice brought an end to fighting in World War One on the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918. 105 years on, Le Quesnoy commemorates Armistice Day (or Remembrance Day) with a series of events over two days. There was an evening cerem ony where the soldiers who died during the first World War were remembered. On the day of the 11th a procession began at the town hall and finished at the Le Quesnoy memorial.

The museum's doors have been open for two months and we have welcomed almost 2000 visitors. The leaves have fallen off the trees and we have even had some snow, but people from France, New Zealand and around the world continue to visit and express how impressed they are with the museum.

It is moving when New Zealanders walk through the gates and the museum experience's impact is visible for us to see. Sunday afternoons are also a very busy and memorable time of the week as locals often come to the museum post Sunday lunch to experience the exhibit and chat together.

As expected, the number of visitors is lessening as we head into winter, but behind the scenes there is plenty of work going on to make 2024 a fantastic year for Te Arawhata. We continue to work with the town hall, local businesses, and tourism partners who are all very enthusiastic about the museum's future. Our plans for Anzac Day and many other events in 2024 are coming along and we already have school groups from New Zealand lined up to visit next summer.

In the meantime, to close out the year we have a Christmas event on 17 December where we will offer guided tours, picture book readings for children and Christmas snacks. This is an opportunity for locals to visit the museum together and build our sense of community before we close for Christmas and get set for the big year ahead.
