NEWS FROM THE NZ LIBERATION MUSEUM - TE ARAWHATA

On 10 February, we held an amazing ceremony at Te Arawhata. The carved bench, donated to the museum by New Zealand Rugby and the All Blacks, was unveiled by the Mayor of Le Quesnoy, Marie Sophie Lesne and New Zealand's Ambassador to France, Her Excellency Caroline Bilkey. Ngāti Rānana (the London Māori Club) opened the ceremony, and blessed the bench with waiata and karakia.

The unveiling was followed by speeches, given by Marie-Sophie Lesne; H.E.Caroline Bilkey; NZ Rugby Commercial Partnerships Manager Mike Moeahu; myself, and All Black Andrew Mehrtens, who spoke in French and charmed the local crowd getting plenty of laughs. This was not his first visit to Le Quesnoy, and he spoke from the heart about the significance of this place for New Zealanders. After the speeches, Ngāti Rānana sang and performed the Ka Mate haka for everyone. It was a powerful moment.

The Mormal Rugby Club served food and drink from their portable bar (made from tree logs), set up under large gazebos in the museum courtyard. We had big screens to televise the France v Scotland Six Nations match (France won the match in the last minute!) It was a great atmosphere and a delight to watch the Mormal junior rugby team members crowding around the bench, getting their photos taken with Ngāti Rānana and Mehrts.

Over three hundred people came for the ceremony, and after official proceedings, there was long queue to get in to the museum. The gift of this taonga allowed us to host a community day that was both solemn and joyful, and all about manaakitanga.

So thank you - to Dame Pasty Reddy for making this happen, to New Zealand Rugby for donating the bench, to the New Zealand Māori Arts and Crafts Institute - Ngā Kete Tuku Iho for making this taonga, and thanks to all who came along. The bench is somewhere to sit, to remember, and to reflect on what this museum represents, including the notions of enduring international community and friendships.

We are otherwise busy receiving visitors and progressing our plans, partnerships, and programmes for 2024. It has been gratifying not only receiving positive comments from visitors about the museum experience, but also being approached by many possible partners in the region, eager to be a part of Te Arawhata's journey and community. Lastly, we are excited to be able to share our Anzac Day plans which I am sure will be a memorable and meaningful weekend, so I hope to see some of you here then.

ANZAC COMMEMORATIONS AT THE NZ LIBERATION MUSEUM - TE ARAWHATA
