Long story short, Robbie helped us through to the opening, and beyond, and then continued on his OE, forever a friend of Te Arawhata. And Josh? JACOB SIERMANS - MARKETING AND OPERATIONS

Jacob was born and raised in North Auckland as part of a tightlyknit Kiwi-Dutch family. With tales of bombing and escape from Rotterdam on one side and service in Egypt and Japan on the other, the family's military history has always been important to him. At age 15, he represented the Silverdale RSA on a tour of New South Wales, culminating in marching under the New Zealand flag in the Sydney ANZAC Parade.

Jacob's passion for French language and culture started at Westlake Boys' High School, which led to an exchange with a Parisian lycée followed by a gap year teaching English at the school. Returning to Auckland in 2016, he attended the University of Auckland, graduating in 2021 with a Bachelor of Laws (Honours) and Bachelor of Arts, the latter majoring in French.

DID YOU KNOW?

PARIS 2024 - THE GAMES OF THE XXXIII OLYMPIAD

You will be watching the NZ Olympians, and soon the Paralympians arriving in Paris, all of them wearing a beautiful pounamu pendant. These taonga Māori are gifts to the teams from Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu, a gift they have given to our Olympians and Paralympians for the last twenty years. This year, it is with pride that we, at Te Arawhata, explain the moving link between the story of Le Quesnoy and the taonga. The design of the pendants is dedicated to the fallen soldiers of Le Quesnoy. As a part of honouring these actions, the carvers designed the taonga to represent 'A Roimata' meaning tears of sadness and grief.

It took Ngāti Māhaki carvers from Te Rūnanga o Makaawhio a year to create the pieces which are made from Tahutahi pounamu, or "snowflake jade". Tahutahi pounamu is one of the rarest types of pounamu. Found only on the Cascade Plateau, south of Haast, the rich and intense green stone has a striking white snowflake effect. Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu has never given permission to outside parties for the collection and sale of the distinctive pounamu from this region until now. Fayne Robinson and Rānui Ngārimu designed the pendants, while Ngāi Tahu Pounamu carvers Caleb Robinson and Tutoko Wallace hand carved them with help from Ben Lakin from Art Fetiche. They were bound by Christina Tamayo and Chantal Tumahai from Ngāi Tahu Pounamu. The pendants are presented to each athlete and team support member as they are welcomed to the Olympic village.

At Te Arawhata we are hugely aware of how important these connections to Aotearoa New Zealand are when you are on the other side of the world. Our Pounamu taonga, gifted to the museum by Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Waewae, greets our visitors and invites their touch, and reminds us everyday that The New Zealand Liberation Museum - Te Arawhata, is bound to home.


